# Maintaining cultural experiences

For almost 30 years the German Department has maintained links with the Aldegrever Gymnasium, a grammar school in the German town of Soest. Students in year 10 can take part in this annual school exchange. As a result of Covid restrictions both here and in Germany, the trip has been on 'pause' for a few years, so we were delighted to be able to get the trip back up and running this academic year. On a dark and cold November morning a group of year 10 students, accompanied by Miss MacEachern and Mr Cobbold, set off for Stansted airport. After



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breezing through security and having enough time to get some breakfast at the airport, we were feeling confident that things were going well. Unfortunately, the weather in Germany had other plans and just before we were due to land in Dortmund, the pilot announced we would be diverting to Münster/Osnabrück Airport due to 'slush on the runway'. Münster/ Osnabrück Airport is neither in Münster nor in Osnabrück, but once we had worked out where we were, we were soon heading to a nearby train station to get to our destination!

Arriving in Soest a couple of hours later than planned, our students were warmly greeted by their exchange partners, and we made our way to the Burghofmuseum to be formally welcomed to Soest by the Mayor's representative and the Headteacher.

The first full day of the exchange saw us all head off to Münster for the day where our students and their partners took part in a 'Stadtspiel', a town trail where they had a couple of hours to find the answers to numerous questions about the town's history, architecture and main tourist sites.

Later that day some time was given to exploring the Christmas markets.

The next day we all headed for the city of Cologne, where students had time to visit the impressive cathedral before spending time at Deutsches Sport- und Olympia Museum, where they were able to try out a range of different activities and learn about the history of the Olympic Games.

Before the weekend, there was time for another excursion to Dortmund where students visited the German Football Museum in the morning before heading to the Signal Iduna Park, better known to us as Borussia Dortmund's football stadium, and even for students who claimed to have no interest in football, this proved to be a very popular outing. We had a tour of the whole stadium by a guide who was clearly a passionate Dortmund fan. Students were able to visit the players' changing rooms, walk through the tunnel to the pitch, sit pitch-side and stand on the famous Südtribüne; Europe's largest standing-area grandstand, holding up to 25,000 fans known as 'Die Gelbe Wand' (The Yellow Wall).

Students then spent time with their host families for the weekend before attending lessons with their partners on the Monday. It was



definitely a shock for our students having to be at school by 07:35am!

Sadly, after a week of history, culture and Christmas markets the trip came to an end and it was time for the students and their exchange partners to say goodbye to each other for a few months.

The return leg took place at the end of February and in a similar format, our students visited London with their partners before the German students visited Cambridge and had a second visit to London where they took the boat from Greenwich into central London. The German students also attended lessons at Northgate with their partners.

We look forward to maintaining this cultural experience for many more years to come!

Riff, the leader of the Jets was played by Lewis in Year 13 and his foe, Bernardo, the leader of the Sharks, was played by Alex in Year 12. There are too many talented students in these gangs to mention them all, but special mention must go to the very brilliant performances of Freddie in Year 9 as Action, Arthur in Year 7 as A-Rab and Finlay in Year 7 as Baby John. # Spectacular Geography trip to Italy

On Friday 9th February, 26 A-Level geographers travelled to Italy for an amazing four day residential, basing ourselves at the Hotel Tourist in Sorrento. A stone's throw away from Vesuvius, Pompeii and the Amalfi coast, Sorrento provided a very safe and ideal base for us to explore Italy. On day one, we visited Naples and the underground tunnel systems used in the Roman era. The tunnels also served as air raid shelters during the Second World War. It was a little bit of a tight squeeze in some of the

tunnels! It was an ideal chance to investigate how fluvial processes have created opportunities for human civilization for centuries and to see how place identity can be solidified through sport – a key element of the Changing Spaces part of the A Level course. Naples also provided us with a wide range of fine-dining opportunities, with many of us opting for traditional Italian pizza for lunch, which was most welcome!

Day two saw us heading to the Vesuvius volcano, which is still

active, for a twenty-minute hike to the crater. Exploring such a contrasting landscape to the arable lands of Suffolk provided a great learning opportunity. The dramatic landscape thoroughly helped our students to see how the sheer size and power of natural hazards are influential in creating 'place' profiles. Vesuvius famously erupted in 79AD, covering the neighbouring settlements in a heavy layer of volcanic tephra, most notably Pompeii. This was our venue for the afternoon's activities, where





our party had an excellent guided tour of the preserved Roman amphitheatre, villas, spas and sports grounds.

On day three, we were very fortunate to travel along the stunning Amalfi coast, with its breath-taking views and fantastic coastal landforms. This was very useful to us as we were able to apply some of the key coastal processes that occur on highenergy coastal environments and see, first-hand, how lithology affects landforms. With its high cliffs, panoramic vistas, headlands and bays, punctuated with luxurious homes and hotels, many students, and indeed staff, enjoyed picking their dream home along this coastline. In Amalfi, some of us were very lucky to witness a traditional Catholic Mass, the spectacular architecture and embrace the local cuisine once more.

The last morning gave us the opportunity to visit a traditional family-run Limoncello business, whose hospitality was second to none. Some students were even brave enough to consume the locally grown lemons, without too





# Applying their theoretical understanding

Year 13 PE students had the opportunity to visit the Human Performance Unit at the University of Essex on February 6th 2024.

The trip gave students the opportunity to apply their theoretical understanding through a variety of physiological and psychological field-based tests.

The morning session consisted of exercise physiology testing, where students analysed data collected from several sub-maximal and maximal tests they undertook. The end of the morning session saw one of our students given the opportunity of undertaking a full VO2 max test using state of the art gas analysis equipment.

The afternoon session gave students the opportunity to reflect upon how varying psychological factors can impact the performance of an athlete. This included reaction time, the effects of an audience on social facilitation or inhibition, and stress management techniques to control arousal and anxiety levels in sport. The afternoon session generated a lot of good-natured competition amongst the students.

Students were also able to evaluate the effective use of such tests in elite sport and analyse how they are used to support athlete progress.

The students got a real experience of some of the detailed theory and work that would form part of several careers in sport, such as sport and exercise physiologists, sports therapists and strength and conditioning coaches.
