A superb achievement

ach year the UK Mathematics Trust runs a series of national competitions known as the Maths Challenges.

The Junior Challenge is for Years 7 and 8 and the Intermediate Challenge is for Years 9, 10 and 11. Depending on their score, students can achieve bronze, silver, or gold awards. The students pictured here with their certificates all achieved the gold award. Nationally, only around 8% of

students reached this level, so this is a fantastic achievement!

In addition, six of our students made it through to the next round of the competition, known as the 'Kangaroo'.

Also, a special mention for Evan in year 8, pictured right, who scored full marks on his Junior Challenge paper – a feat only ever managed once before at Northgate!

remember, and continue the legacy of Jo Cox MP and her belief that 'We have more in common than that which divides us', coinciding with national events.



In March, the students were invited to join Franstine at the Race, Education and Social Media event at the Houses of Parliament Committee Rooms. This event was



hosted by Ms Dawn Butler MP. The students found this really interesting and would like to thank Mr Jenner for accompanying them on the trip and Franstine for leading this programme and being a fantastic mentor.

SparX Project

This year, Northgate students have participated in a fantastic new empowerment project for young people called SparX, led by Karen Walker. The project aims to empower students by fostering confidence, resilience, and supportive networks. Weekly sessions have focused on friendship building, self-identity, resilience and decision-making. This project has supported girls of African, Caribbean and dual heritage



backgrounds in Year 8 and 9. Participants shared their learning by presenting at the Suffolk DEI Network's Schools Showcase which took place at The Hold in November. The students were praised by other schools and community leaders for the way they inspired younger students with their presentation. In April, students received their certificates for completing all of the modules in the programme. We are immensely proud of them. Over the last term, 86 students have been preparing for and completing their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze expeditions – and all lived to tell the tale!

It all began with the practice weekend at Alton Water, where students learned the basics of map reading, using a compass, and the very real difference between a footpath and a field full of confused cows. Let us just say it became clear early on that "finding north" was not as easy as it sounds.

Next came the two qualifying weekends. This time, students were entirely self-sufficient – planning their routes, organising their meals, carrying everything on their backs and camping overnight. Tents were pitched (eventually), stoves were lit and pasta was eaten by the kilo (we may have caused a local shortage).

Both qualifying weekends came with their own unique challenges. The first group faced warm weather and blazing sunshine – a blessing for dry tents, but not for tired legs hauling heavy rucksacks packed with food, sleeping gear and enough water to stay hydrated.

The second weekend brought quite the opposite: thunder and relentless downpours that turned paths into puddles and maps into papier-mâché. And yet, through it all, students remained positive – laughing through the storms, wringing out their socks and proving



that resilience really does come in all weather conditions.

Wake-up calls came courtesy of the sunrise – not an alarm clock in sight – with the first groups packed up and out of camp by 8am. Not bad, considering the struggle of stuffing a sleeping bag into a sack that clearly shrank overnight.

The route took students from Grundisburgh to Wickham Market and back, walking a minimum of six hours a day. Along the way, they faced overgrown footpaths, unexpected detours, achy legs, and the endless mystery of whether they were heading in the right direction. (Hint: if you're back at the start by lunchtime... probably not.)

Despite the sore feet, sore shoulders and a few navigational mishaps, what stood out most was the teamwork. Students supported each other through injuries, shared food and kept going when it would have been easier to just lie down





and become part of the scenery.

A massive thank you goes out to the wonderful team of staff volunteers who gave up their weekends to supervise, encourage and occasionally redirect students who were enthusiastically heading in the wrong direction.

So, well done to all involved – you have earned your badges, your blisters and a very long nap. Now, it is time to focus on the final stages: completing the volunteering, physical and skills sections to fully earn your Bronze Awards. Keep going – you are almost there!
